Shepherd Community Center stands proudly behind our mission to break the cycle of poverty, but we often get asked the question, *"How does Shepherd know if they are really making a difference?"*

Obviously, it is not possible to break the cycle of poverty for everyone. But we can surely make a difference – and do – in the lives of everyone who comes through our doors. At the core of everything we do at Shepherd Community is hope. How? By building authentic

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relationships with our neighbors that create hope. **We call this model 10 Assets for holistic change: faith, health, support, stability, skills, models, advocacy, knowledge, future, and income.** Building our 10 Assets reduces dependency and grows capacity for our neighbors to live lives of hope.

We have many stories, where individuals have a different story – a different life – thanks to our 10 Assets model of support, care, and hope. Stories like De’Niece.

Shepherd came into De’Niece’s life when she was in 3rd grade. Raised by a single

shelters. It wasn’t uncommon for us to not have food. I didn’t know the things that happened weren’t normal until I was much older.”

Shepherd became the place where bright De’Niece could be safe and find hope for a different life. “What Shepherd gave me was wrap around support and stability,” said De’Niece. “Shepherd helped cultivate my interests and modeled for me the skills, knowledge, and opportunities I needed to flourish and achieve those dreams. **Shepherd never let me give up on myself. They encouraged my strengths and showed me how I could succeed. They gave me hope.**”

“For me, hope is the expectation that things will get better,” says De’Niece with a giant smile. **“Hope saved my mom’s life and got her clean. Hope helped me get to and through college. Hope keeps me going every day.”**

With her current job at One America as a Pathways Program Director, De’Niece now creates safe spaces for kids to help them see the hope for a future and new life. Just as Shepherd advocated for her, De’Niece now stands in the gap and advocates for students who were just like her. “I want kids to see for themselves that there is hope. I want to help them – even if they are starting from nothing – and make it,” De’Niece proudly expresses. **“I get to pay that forward the same way that Shepherd did that for me.”**

If we build and grow assets, then we will help reduce dependency and grow capacity for our neighbors to live stable lives of hope, breaking the cycle of poverty for themselves and future generations – just like De’Niece.

Support Summer EXCEL 2022

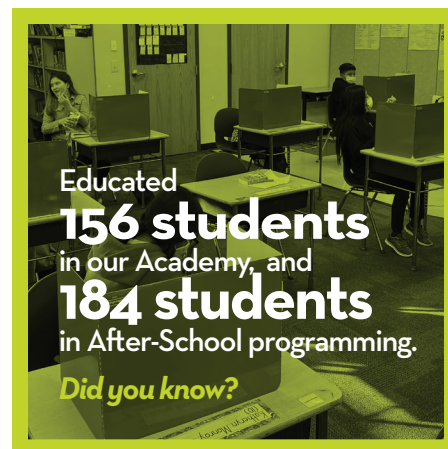

Volunteer to Make a Difference

Weekly Food Delivery: Help to drive food boxes full of healthy food to over 300 neighbors each week. Drivers most needed 9 – 11:30am Thursdays and Fridays but can volunteer any day Monday – Friday. Ten volunteers are needed each of these days.

After-School Tutoring: Be a positive influence and help students grow academically. Volunteers would be given materials to use in assisting students. Volunteers are needed:

- **Elementary Grades 1-5:** Tutoring Mon – Thurs from 3:15 - 4:30pm at Shepherd Community. Need five to ten volunteers a day.

- **IPS #58 Grades 1-6:** Tutoring Mon – Thurs 3:45 – 6pm at IPS School #58 (located about 3 miles from Shepherd). Need five volunteers a day.

Childcare for Celebrate Recovery:

Provide childcare for neighbors who come to the Celebrate Recovery Program at Shepherd Community Church on Tuesday nights from 5:45 – 8pm. Volunteers must be over eighteen.

Weekend Food Packs: Packing weekend food packs for Academy students. Flexible volunteer times available.

Food Pantry: Help set up and assist neighbors with picking out food items every Saturday, 8 – 10:30am. Need five to eight volunteers each week.
